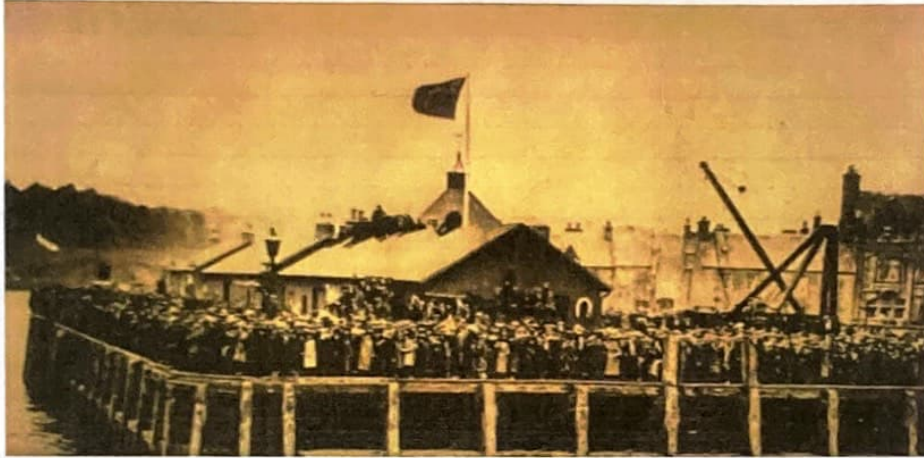

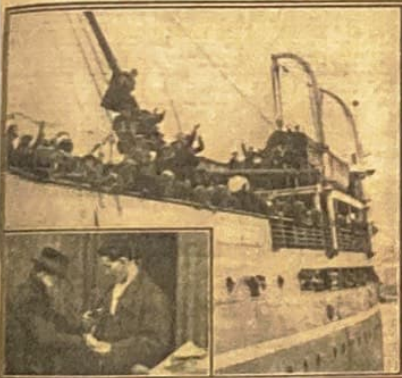

STORNOWAY SCENES: MORE EMIGRANTS FROM THE WESTERN ISLES



The Canadian Pacific liner *Strathcona*, leaving Stornoway on Saturday with another large contingent of emigrants from Scotland, including about 200 young men from Lewis. The white population of the island gathered on the pier to bid these good-bye. The picture here on the left shows the Rev. Mr. Phinlay presenting the emigrants with a Gaelic Bible from the Ladies' Highland Association before going on board.



The accompanying sea was gullier than that at Lachinvalle last week-end, the emigrants all being young men in their prime. They danced merrily on deck to the strains of the bagpipes, but proved to take part in a little religious service conducted by two ministers who came aboard to see them off. 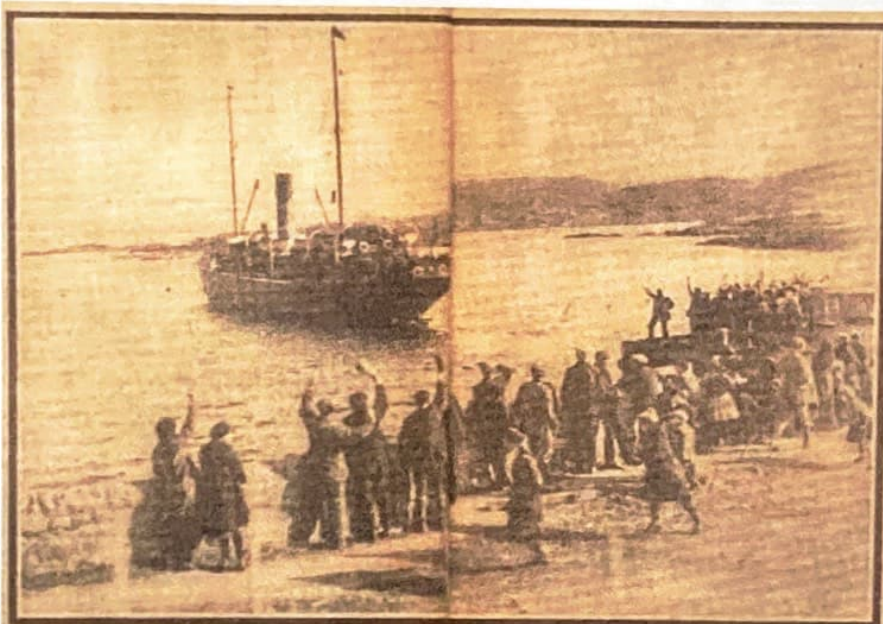

Farewell Scenes in the Hebrides 400 Islanders Sailed for Canada.



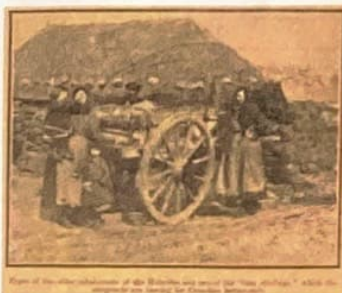

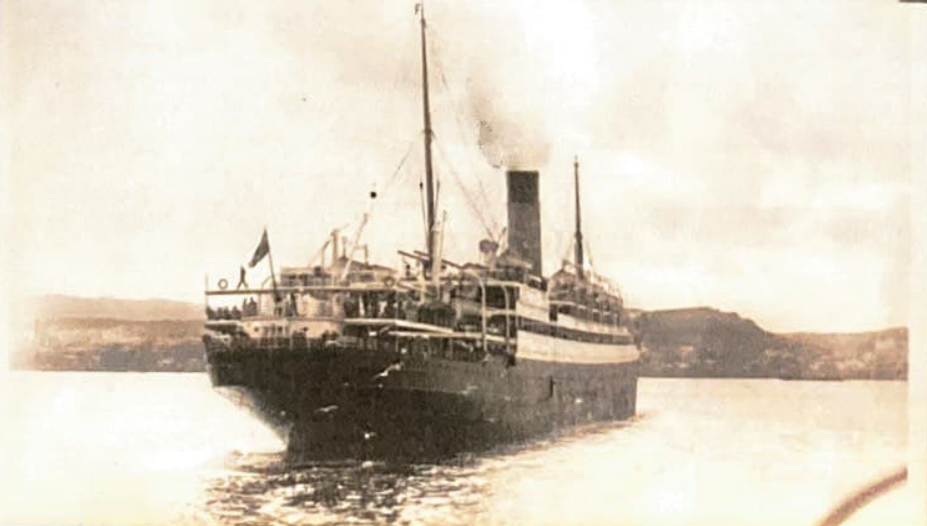
